Re: Record Search Results for the Lincoln at Euclid Project

The South Central Coastal Information Center received your records search request for the project area referenced above, located on the Anaheim, CA USGS 7.5' quadrangle. The following summary reflects the results of the records search for the project area and a ½-mile radius. The search includes a review of all recorded archaeological and built-environment resources as well as a review of cultural resource reports on file. In addition, the California Points of Historical Interest (SPHI), the California Historical Landmarks (SHL), the California Register of Historical Resources (CAL REG), the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), and the California State Historic Properties Directory (HPD) listings were reviewed for the above referenced project site and a ¼-mile radius. Due to the sensitive nature of cultural resources, archaeological site locations are not released.

HISTORIC MAP REVIEW – Anaheim, CA (1896, 1942) 15' USGS historic maps indicate that in 1896 the Southern Pacific R.R. (Santa Ana Branch) ran through the project area and there were several buildings and roads within the project search radius. In 1942, there were two buildings in addition to the rail road within the project area. There were additional roads and buildings within the project search radius.

RECOMMENDATIONS

According to our records, the project area and most of the surrounding radius has not been surveyed for cultural resources. Earlier maps depict the presence of a freeway on-ramp or off-ramp within the project area. Additionally, a railroad line is adjacent to the property which has been present since at least 1896. Without a survey, the archaeological sensitivity of the project site is unknown. Therefore, it is recommended that a qualified archaeological consultant be retained to survey the property for cultural resources prior to the approval of project plans. It is also recommended that any buildings, structures or objects (45 years and older) be identified, recorded, and evaluated for significance as may be required by the lead agency. Finally, the Native American Heritage Commission should be consulted to identify if any additional traditional cultural properties or other sacred sites are known to be in the area.
